

HELPING TO FIND YOUR INVERNESS COUNTY ROOTS

Publications

People interested in early genealogical charts of some of the Anglo-Saxon and Norman rulers of England, and of families of the Holy Roman Empire, and of other ancient and medieval families, may obtain a free sample chart and price list from Donald Charles Stone, 2401 Pennsylvania Avenue, Apt. 9B-28,Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, USA 19130.


Local Researchers trying to locate relatives who settled in Boston, frequently have difficulty with the large number of locations in Boston itself where probate, church and land records are held. A new comprehensive guide is being prepared by Ann S. Lainhart and will be published by the New England Historic Genealogical Society, 101 Newbury Street, Boston, USA 02116-3007. The publication, which will be ready for distribution later in the year, is titled *A Researchers Guide to Boston*.

Through the New England Historic Genealogical Society data base: New EnglandAncestors.org, a number of items of interest to local researchers may be consulted, e.g. *An Hibernian or General Description of the Kingdom of Ireland* published in 1798. It shows Ireland and all its counties and baronies and a number of its cities, towns and villages. Also, the 1740 census for the counties of Antrim, Derry, Donegal and Londonderry - the head of household is listed and both Protestants and Roman Catholics are included.

QUERY:

William Robbins of Historical Research Inc. of Alberta, is searching for information regarding vehicles built by the Waters family of Whycocomagh. He is doing research on buggies, wagons and sleighs owned by a private collector of horsedrawn vehicles.

One such vehicle probably manufactured by the Waters family, is a "transfer hearse" which has a second business name lettered on the seat of the hearse. The second name is W. J. Stoddard. What was the connection between the Whycocomagh manufacturers and Stoddard?

Sources:

1. One of the very useful sources for history about local communities and people is the correspondence of the District Postal Inspector in Halifax. In this correspondence (found on microfilm reels in Record Group 24 at the Nova Scotia Archives) are petitions signed by hundreds of people for new post offices - including those which were named and opened, and quite a number which were not. Tracings from a map prepared in 1896 shows all

existing post offices, their mail routes, and mileage between offices. The names of designated post-masters and post-mistresses are also included. The originals are to be found at the National Archives of Canada in Ottawa.

2. A gathering of some of the specific information found in these records as well as from other sources is the publication prepared by Carl Munden in 1987. Entitled, Post Offices of Inverness County, Cape Breton, this work may be found in a number of collections. Take for example the listing for McKinnons Brook, according to Munden's information the post office was opened on 1 June 1900 and closed on 16 October 1929. There were only two postmasters -Ronald Beaton for the first two years and Alexander Beaton for the remaining time. The number of families served by this PO upon its inauguration was ten, and an early alternate name (which some people favoured) was Glenroy (perhaps indicating the Beaton connection to that place in Scotland).

The Whale Cove Settlement's Post Office was officially "McLean Cove". It had just one postmaster from the time of its opening in 1925 to its closing in 1947. Haverstock McLean was the postmaster for all those years.

Little River, Chéticamp, was opened on 1 July 1888 and its name was changed on 1 June 1926 to Petit Étang with the office continuing under that name. There were seventy families who received

In 1918 the women of nova scotia won

their mail there when it opened and Lazaire LeBlanc was the postmaster; it was in 1926 that Simon LeBlanc came to be his successor.

3. The publication in 1980 by the Genealogical Committee of the Royal Nova Scotia Historical Society of Loyalists and Land Settlement in Nova Scotia, brings together the essential information to be found in hundreds of land records relating mostly to Loyalists who came to Nova Scotia - some of whom went on to Cape Breton. The material is divided

> into sections as per the counties. Many Inverness County names are found in the various records, most particularly that of Guysborough County: e.g. Thomas Fox who came to

Port Hastings and is said to be of the Saint Augustine, Florida settlers; Donald McLeod who came to Mabou; James Adams, whose wife later married McLeod; Thomas Brownly, later of Northeast Mabou and listed as a disbanded soldier of the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment; James Proctor whose family eventually settled at Lower River Inhabitants. In Halifax County, Ebenezer Leadbetter, who later came to Mabou Harbour Mouth, was granted 350 acres in 1784. Much valuable information may be found within the onehundred and fifty pages of this book.

4. Another publication of the Genealogical Committee of the Royal Nova Scotia Historical Society (the predecessor of the Nova Scotia Genealogical Society) that is of much interest and use, is the compilation (in several volumes) of vital statistics from Nova Scotia newspapers. Of much use is the list of ships included in various news accounts - some of these vessels had Cape Breton captains or crew and some eventually met sad ends on the rocks of our coast. For those trying to trace various vessels, the lists in these publications is valuable. There are many genealogical clues as well in the abstracts from news items, from obituaries, and announcements of births and marriages.

<u>LeBlancs and Whites - Margaree and Stephenville, Newfoundland</u>. Information in manuscript form, obtained by Steve Basker and compiled by Allan T. Stride of Ottawa, demonstrates the connection between Étienne and Célestin Leblanc of Margaree and Stephenville, Newfoundland.

The article shows as well that Stephenville was named for Étienne Leblanc (Stephen being the common translation of the name Étienne). Étienne Leblanc, born about 1795, and his brother Célestin, born about 1797, were the children of Hilaire and Scholastique Leblanc of Margaree. Hilaire lived at Arichat when he was a child. The family formerly lived at Grand Pré. Étienne was married to Anne Marie Cormier in 1817, according to parish records, and they moved to Bay St. George, Newfoundland, about 1845.

All of the children of Étienne and Anne Marie were born in Margaree. Although sources differ, two authorities quoted in the article claim that Stephenville, Newfoundland, was named for Stephen White (as he was known more commonly after his arrival in Newfoundland).

It would appear that at least one of the family of Étienne and Marie returned to Margaree to live, from which person descended a large number of Inverness County residents. It is hoped that in future articles we may continue the story of this family.



SEARCHING FOR ANCESTORS - JUST ANOTHER CEMETERY STORY

My father has passed away, but he left me a family tree that showed a 3rd-great-grandfather and 3rd-great-grandmother buried in a certain cemetery near a certain church in Brunerstown, Kentucky, at a certain distance in a certain direction from Louisville. I could not find Brunerstown on a map. No one had ever heard of Brunerstown. I thought Dad had made a mistake.

Recently I was able to visit Louisville. In a genealogy library, where the librarians had not heard of Brunerstown or the church or cemetery, I found a small local history of



another little town, Jeffersontown, where some family had married. Lo and behold, the author wrote that it was once called Brunerstown. The book was written 25 years ago and said the church Dad had mentioned was still around. I found the church in a phone book and begged the hotel staff to make a map. Then I told my husband we were taking a ride.

The church wasn't open when we got there, so I knocked on the door of a nearby house. It was the parsonage, and although the parson couldn't come to the door, the teenage son gave directions to the cemetery. We followed the directions, but it was only because of my husband's sharp eyes that we saw the little signs taking us through a new subdivision.

When we started walking through the cemetery my heart sank. The older stones were illegible and we were looking for a death in 1848. After 15 minutes, as the sun was setting, I told my husband we should give up. Just at that moment, I glanced down at an old tilting stone next to me, and there, set into the ground in front of it, was a wonderful bronze plaque with my ancestor's name on it. He was a veteran of the War of 1812, and it seems someone had placed plaques throughout the cemetery at the graves of each veteran.

After much gasping and many happy exclamations, I then noticed that his wife was buried next to him and by some stroke of fortune, her stone was legible.

Think of the ways I could have missed these graves! No information from Dad, no local history publication, no available phone book, no hotel staff to make a map, no one at home at the parsonage, no signs to the cemetery in the ground, no veterans' plaques, no kind fate smiling upon me with regard to the wife—any one of these things would have derailed me. So I ask you, was it meant to be? Lessons learned: Read everything! Persist! And trust Dad!



Enjoy the solitude and beauty of Fishing Cove Trail

Visitors to the Cape Breton Highlands National Park generally discover its spectacular scenery and rugged landscapes from their cars as they drive the Cabot Trail. Hikers however, are rewarded with extra special sights and experiences as they take time to enjoy the quiet and solitude of the trails. Hikers will tell you that the experience of hiking seems to enhance the scenery, while affording them the opportunity to discover the shy or subtle elements that remain invisible to those who choose to motor through.

The hiker has access to unique unspoiled perspectives from every view, and the pleasure derived from this is heightened by the achievement of having worked for it. Hikers also see those unique wilderness areas of spectacular beauty that can only be reached by hiking in. I personally believe that hiking is by far the best

back, is a truly special trip. On this particular trail one is completely immersed in the natural world; this is a place to revel in the splendour and serenity of the forest and coastline in solitude. I highly recommend the discovery of the delights of nature and the wonderful feeling of strength and vigor which come from hiking the trail.

The Fishing Cove trail begins by the Old Cabot Trail bridge, five-hundred feet below the Fishing Cove parking lot on the Cabot Trail. This hiking trail is a steady descent to rugged ocean coastline. The distance is 16 kilometres (10 miles) return. The trail is unique - it ends at an abandoned village site and is the only coastal wilderness campsite in the

way to explore the red cliffs, highland glens and river meadows of the Cape Breton Highlands.

For a truly invigorating and worthwhile outdoor experience, hiking the spectacular Fishing Cove Trail in the Cape Breton Highlands National Park is highly recommended. One of many excellent trails in Inverness County, I hike it at least once every summer. I find that this trip does much to refresh my soul. Away from the hustle and bustle of normal daily life, this is a tranquil region where the birds sing and chatter and the trees smell fresh and intensely aromatic.

In my own experience, hiking the Fishing Cove Trail with camping gear and a few days' supply of food in the knapsack on my

Cape Breton Highlands National Park. (For those hikers who desire a shorter hike, there is also a four kilometre alternate route to the cove.)

One should be in good shape before attempting to undertake the long hike, as there are several steep hills and long ascents on the trail. I recommend taking along plenty of high-energy trail mix, enough water and a picnic lunch. Wear sturdy hiking boots, hat and sunglasses (don't forget the sunblock). Try to stay on the established trail so as to avoid trampling rare and endangered vegetation.

Fishing, photography, or bird-watching on the trail can also provide hours of enjoyment. Studying the flora and fauna can be immensely interesting and absorbing. Among the wildlife that may be seen along the trail are moose, deer, bear and a variety of songbirds.

Seasoned hikers and wilderness campers will also appreciate the challenge of the trail. Extra care is recommended where the trail to the cove winds down the steep slope of the river valley. Despite routine maintenance, it is sometimes blocked by landslides or windfallen trees. Nevertheless, obstacles such as these will not deter the serious backpacker or hiker from reaching the groves and open meadows lower down.

Once down in the cove, you'll find it's a great place swim - if the sea is calm and you don't mind the water being a bit chilly. However be alert, the current can quickly pull

a swimmer away from shore. It is best not to swim alone, do stay close to the shore.

For backpackers, a few undisturbed days spent here could prove unforget-table - exploring the meadows, swimming in either salt or fresh water, with excellent fishing prospects in the river. However, another cautionary note - the weather here can change rapidly - campers should come prepared for all situations.

As early as 1830 a few families were farming and fishing in this cove and, in

1897, a Halifax entrepreneur built a lobster cannery by the cobblestone beach. After the cannery closed, people began to move up the coast to Pleasant Bay. The village of Fishing Cove has been deserted since 1912

If you do plan to spend the night here, a camping permit is required. Permits are also required by anyone using any of the park facilities - this includes hiking the trails. Permits may be purchased at the entrance to the park or from the information offices. So purchase a permit, hoist your backpack, adjust the shoulder straps, tighten the waist belt, fill your water bottle and head out. Fishing Cove is a remote paradise and you will immediately fall in love with its awesome beauty. •

Just the bear facts ...

It's always fun to enjoy the outdoors, but when hiking or otherwise travelling in the backcounty, are you a responsible trail user? Do you ... 1. Know The Area. - Ask area park staff, wildlife officers or the local police agency about recent bear activity and what types of bears live in the area. If bear sightings have been frequent in a particular area you are wise to choose another trail opportunity.

2. Make Your Presence Known. - Bears tend to steer clear of human contact if they can. Creating noise may help in avoiding a bear encounter - yell, sing or clap frequently while on the trail.

- 3. Travel In Groups of Two or More. In a worst case scenario your buddy will at least be able to go for help. As well, the impact of a group of humans may be more off-putting to a bear than a lonely hiker or cyclist.
- 4. Share Your Plans. Make sure someone knows where you are going and when you plan to return (use the form on page 27).
- 5. Watch for Signs of Bear. Bear signs include: tracks; droppings which contain vegetation, berries, or hair; clawmarks or stripped bark on trees, torn up stumps, or rotten logs; and upturned earth. Keep your eyes on the trail as far ahead as possible. Take extra care when travelling into the wind or close by loud moving water bears may not be able to see or smell you and you could surprise them!
- 6. Reduce Odors That Attract Bears. Always carry food in airtight or bearproof containers and avoid carrying foods with strong smells. Do not carry articles that have a strong artificial smell and avoid wearing scented cosmetics.
- 7. Steer Clear of Dead Wildlife. Change your route to avoid dead wildlife. Don't investigate dead wildlife you may be inspecting a bear's lunch!
- 8. Leave Pets At Home. If you must take your dog, keep it on a leash at all times. An unleashed dog can lead an aggravated

bear right to you. 9. Carry Bear Deterrents. - Deterrents include bear repellent, air horns, bear bangers and flashers. Training for the proper use and storage of deterrents is necessary before heading out on the trail. A 12-Gauge shot gun is recommended for back country excursions - it can fire some deterrents as well as slugs and buckshot. 10. Report Bear Encounters. - Make the trails as safe as


